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Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Hiawassee ES serves 610 students enrolled in grades Kindergarten through fifth. The student population's ethnicity is made of 11% Hispanic and 89% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 10% White, 87% Black, 0% Native, 1% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 2% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Sharon Jenkins and Assistant Principal Forrester Watts. Hiawassee ES is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Accelerated Reader Point Club, News Crew, Safety patrols, Sunshine State Young Readers Award, PreK and after school tutoring to provide students opportunities to practice their skills.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Hiawassee ES indicates that the average age of the collection is 2011 and the number of books per student is 11.7. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Hiawassee ES does not meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Students in this school's fourth and fifth grade reading proficiencies decreased; however, third grade reading proficiency increased.
- Our third and fifth grade students' math scores also increased; however, fourth grade math scores decreased.
- Based on the reading scores, more books should be purchased on lower level/high interest books.
- The Nonfiction collection's average age is 2010-older than recommended.
- Items per student is 11.7-lower than recommended.

- We have a need to increase the percentage of books with characters reflecting our large population of African American students.
- In addition to the physical media center collection, the district provides almost 5,000 eBooks, audiobooks and digital magazines.
- Weeding will continue to focus on aged/worn titles in nonfiction, the OCPS Catalog Project, uncirculated titles and the overall appearance of the library. When weeding is completed, the average age of the collection will build on the gains made the previous year.
- The balance of fiction and nonfiction favors fiction. Additional nonfiction titles are needed.

The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and

previous years' data. The implementation of FAST K-2 in the 2022-23 school year was the first administration of statewide

Collection Analysis

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

Results

Based on the available school data of Hiawassee ES in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:

- 2014 is the average age of titles representing African Americans in the collection; updated titles should be added to the Biography, Nonfiction, and Fiction sections.
- This media center needs more books featuring Latin characters and nonfiction/biographies/fiction with Hispanic role models.

• The average publication date for the Hispanic books is 2016 which is above what is expected.
